



## **AUSTRALIAN CUSTOMS DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2013/32**

### **Aluminium Zinc Coated Steel**

### **Exported from Taiwan**

### **Termination of Investigation**

#### ***Customs Act 1901 – Part XV B***

On 5 September 2012 the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of the Australian Customs and Border Protection Service (Customs and Border Protection) initiated an investigation into the alleged dumping of aluminium zinc coated steel exported to Australia from the People's Republic of China (China), the Republic of Korea (Korea) and Taiwan, following an application lodged by BlueScope Steel Limited.

Customs and Border Protection published a notice in *The Australian* on 5 September 2012 notifying of the initiation of the investigation, and issued Australian Customs Dumping Notice (ACDN) 2012/40, which contains further details on the investigation, available at <http://www.customs.gov.au/anti-dumping/notices.asp>.

As a result of Customs and Border Protection's investigation, the Delegate of the CEO of Customs and Border Protection is satisfied that:

- there has been no dumping by Yieh Phui Enterprise Co. Ltd of aluminium zinc coated steel exported from Taiwan; and
- there has been no dumping by any other exporters of aluminium zinc coated steel from Taiwan and therefore the volume of aluminium zinc coated steel exported to Australia from Taiwan that have been dumped is negligible.

Therefore, in accordance with subsection 269TDA(1) of the *Customs Act 1901* (the Act) the Delegate of the CEO of Customs and Border Protection has decided to terminate the investigation into the alleged dumping of aluminium zinc coated steel so far as it relates to Yieh Phui Enterprise Co. Ltd.

In accordance with subsection 269TDA(3) of the Act the Delegate of the CEO of Customs and Border Protection has decided to terminate the remainder of the investigation into the alleged dumping of aluminium zinc coated steel from Taiwan.

In making the decisions to terminate, the Delegate of the CEO has had regard to the application, submissions from interested parties, Statement of Essential Facts (SEF) no. 190, submissions in response to that SEF, and other relevant information.

Termination Report no. 190B, which sets out reasons for the termination decisions, including the material findings of fact or law upon which the decisions are based, has been placed on Customs and Border Protection's public record, available at <http://www.customs.gov.au/anti-dumping/cases.asp>. Alternatively, the public record may be examined at Customs House by contacting the case manager on the details provided below.

A notice of the decision to terminate was published in *The Australian* newspaper on 2 May 2013.

Dumping securities will no longer be required from 2 May 2013 for importations of aluminium zinc coated steel exported from Taiwan. Dumping securities already collected for the relevant importations from these exporters will be cancelled. Customs and Border Protection will contact affected importers on the process in the coming weeks.

Customs and Border Protection provided its report to the Minister for Home Affairs in respect of this investigation on 30 April 2013.

The applicant may request a review of the delegate's decision to terminate the investigation by lodging an application with the Trade Measures Review Officer in the approved form and manner within 30 days of the publication of the public notice.
